EMERGENCY OVERNIGHT SHELTER

This housing-focused program offers safe emergency overnight shelter and intensive case management, serving up to 8 gender diverse individuals, 16+, each night, with 2 additional crisis or isolation beds available in critical circumstances. Service users have access to a warm bed, food, showers, essential supplies, harm reduction materials, and onsite support to assist in finding temporary or permanent housing solutions, tailored to their unique needs and circumstances.



In September 2023, the Emergency Overnight Shelter (EOS) Program transitioned to year-round operations. This enhancement enables us to better serve the South Simcoe community by providing sustainable, reliable, and consistent support for individuals experiencing homelessness. Since the year-round launch, the number of service users has continued to climb, demonstrating the ongoing need for services, like ours, to support those experiencing the effects of poverty.

SHIFTing FORTUNES: KELLY'S TRIUMPH

Kelly's journey with S.H.I.F.T. began in early fall, when she found herself seeking support in our Emergency Overnight Shelter Program. After being unfairly discharged from a treatment facility for an unfounded assumption regarding her sobriety, Kelly faced a scary reality – she had nowhere to go. With no family or friends to lean on, she arrived at our doors, looking for support and stability within our program.

Once Kelly arrived at SHIFT, she found the stability and non-judgmental support she needed from our shelter and drop-in staff. With this support, Kelly was able to start planning and working towards her housing and overall life goals. She connected with local addiction support groups, reconnected with a previous employer and secured gainful employment. Soon after, Kelly was accepted into a post secondary course with Georgian College for 2024.

With the support and resources Kelly was offered through S.H.I.F.T.'s programs and staff, she successfully transitioned from shelter to stable permanent housing in just 22 days! But perhaps the most heartwarming chapter of Kelly's journey unfolded when she regained custody

of her child shortly after her departure. Through her unwavering dedication to her sobriety and the stable and consistent support of our S.H.I.F.T. team, Kelly proved herself to be a survivor

Kelly's story serves as a powerful reminder of the impact of community and compassion. And as she continues her journey, she carries with her the love and support of her S.H.I.F.T. family, a testament to the transformative power of connection within our safe and supportive environment.

PARTNERSHIPS AND COLLABORATION



S.H.I.F.T. partners with Simcoe County Paramedic Services to ensure that our AED machines are always in good working order and stocked with

life-saving supplies. In addition, the Community Paramedicine Team attends our DDI program once per month to provide onsite medical supports to service users. This partnership allows service users to make connections with health care in a non-judgmental and safe environment



SMDHU contracts S.H.I.F.T. as a needle exchange site, and they partner with us to provide safe use supplies, naloxone

and other harm reduction resources. We have also had the privilege of piloting several harm reductionbased kits on behalf of SMDHU, providing important data to help inform continued provision of these supports. We are grateful to receive the bulk of our supplies and guidance on trends on harm reduction from SMDHU.



In a new collaboration, S.H.I.F.T. partners with the County of Simcoe Ontario Works department, to host a No-Fixed

(NFA) Case Wanderessonsite weekly in our Drop-in This partnership allows service users to connect with and establish income supports as a part of their housing goals, which helps to cover the cost of their basic needs and gain access to housing retention assistance once they have secured permanent housing



ASCO partners with S.H.I.F.T. to provide access

in our Drop-In Goding Phobi-weekly, as well as assist us with referrals to the local Rapid Addiction Medicine (RAM) clinic. In addition, ASCO provides fentanyl testing strips to hand out as a part of our harm reduction programming. This partnership helps our staff to facilitate connection to much needed supports within the community.



care that supports service users to achieve their housing goals. while accessing our programming. A CONTACT Housing Access Worker attends S.H.I.F.T.'s drop-in centre weekly to make connections and foster relationship building in a familiar and safe space for service users. This collaboration is paramount in our service users' journey, as they move from experiencing homelessness to becoming housed as quickly and seamlessly as possible. We are grateful for the ongoing partnership with CONTACT Community Services, as the only service providers of our kind in South Simcoe

Scollaborate Aimed at addressing the needs of the nottawasaga community's most vulnerable individuals, this is a joint initiative among community partners in the Nottawasaga catchment. S.H.I.F.T. attends weekly meetings. which prioritize high-risk cases and ensure comprehensive supports, facilitating a coordinated and effective approach to helping the community's most vulnerable. This partnership helps to break down silos, increase efficiencies, and mobilize responses within 24-48 hours to address issues proactively.

DAYTIME DROP-IN CENTRE

The Daytime Drop-In Centre (DDI) program provides a safe daytime respite, warm hospitality, and comprehensive support, including meals, clothing, and shower facilities. Open daily to individuals 16+, who are experiencing homelessness and food insecurity, the program offers access to essential supplies, harm reduction materials, and a computer workstation. Onsite staff assist service users in accessing resources and provide necessary support to achieve housing goals.



Support Workers are available to help service users with housing-related activities and accessing local and county-based services. Intake Workers offer intensive case management to help service users reach their goals and connect with community supports. Onsite resources include computers, internet, printers, phones, and informational materials, along with essential supplies such as personal hygiene and harm reduction items. Staff also provide referrals to other social services and assist with any necessary paperwork to access these services.

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STREET AND COMMUNITY OUTREACH



The Mobile Street and Community Outreach (MSCO) program delivers mobile support across the municipalities of South Simcoe to individuals experiencing or at risk of homelessness. The program offers lifesaving resources, supplies, referrals, and brief case management with a strong focus on homelessness prevention and providing the necessary support to help individuals thrive and remain housed.

The Outreach team provides essential resources, including personal hygiene and harm reduction supplies, food, and access to other vital necessities. They offer both soft and direct referrals to social services and organizations, assisting with any necessary referral paperwork. Staff are available to guide and support individuals in accessing local and county-based resources, offering brief case management to help them achieve their goals and connect with community support systems.

SHIFTing PERSPECTIVES: ENCAMPMENT RESPONSE PROTOCOL

In early fall, regional government staff reached out to S.H.I.F.T. for support to assist a couple reported living in a tent on public property. In partnership, S.H.I.F.T. was able to discuss a best practices approach with the identified Township and an agreement was

reached to allow the team to take the lead and attempt engagement before any form of enforcement efforts would take place to commence removal of the individuals.

team quickly realized that these individuals were Suzie and Chris, who we had already met a few times. With continued engagement, the team was able to further our dialogue with them to encourage safe housing alternatives. The couple initially felt despondent and that they had no options for housing and were very homelessness. hesitant to enter shelter.

With the the threat of colder weather and continued support from the outreach team, Suzie and Chris decided to leave their tent site, taking

full responsibility for its tear down and clean up, without needing any additional intervention from S.H.I.F.T. or local bylaw. Suzie entered our shelter, while Chris was able to stay with family as they continued their search for housing.

This intervention has established a positive precedent for our collaboration with the leadership staff of the Townships of South Simcoe, their respective enforcement departments, and our local policing services. As a result, we are now their first call for support when they encounter individuals living rough or unhoused within the community. This initial dialogue has fostered a deeper understanding and empathy towards those experiencing



A MESSAGE FROM OUR TREASURER

What a year 2023 has been! Our biggest change has been transitioning our shelter from a winter-based program to providing year-round services, bringing financial changes from government funding, community fundraising, and program staffing.

Government Funding: S.H.I.F.T. received unexpected funds to support service contracts through the County of Simcoe, allowing us to expand all programming aspects.

Community Fundraising: A community grant enabled us to hire a Donor Relations and Stewardship Officer, boosting our fundraising efforts and securing essential donations, grants, and foundational funds.

Program Staffing: We increased staffing to ensure consistent, safe, and appropriate services for our participants, adhering to best practice standards.

I am continually grateful for the new accounting software implemented in 2022, which has kept our financials organized and county reporting up to date.
